



# History

The camp has been in existence for over sixty years. It started in 1938 as a camp for boys to learn about soil and water conservation. Originally named Kosciusko Council of Conservation Clubs, Inc., in the 1950's the name changed to C. O. Mollenhour in honor of Chauncy Mollenhour for his dedication to the camp. The focus of the camp eventually changed to bring outdoor skills to boys and recently girls as well.

The camp is staffed by volunteers. It provides cabins, modern restrooms and showers, and cooking facilities. The camp can accommodate up to 80 boys and/or girls ages 9-14.

# Guals of Project

To increase the awareness of the camp and it's services in the community.

To contact and seek out identifiable sources of possible funding to support camp services either in the form of a child's registration or general maintenance.

To establish procedures and informational sources as references that can be used by future camp directors and/or volunteers in order to maintain up to date contacts.

To identify new uses of camp facilities in order to boost camp income to promote the longevity of the facilities

### Guals Obtained

Several organizations were contacted either in person or through a letter (see attached letter and list of contacts). A few of these organizations invited us to speak at one of their meetings. These contacts were important for two reasons. One, to build community awareness of the camp and it's services. Two, to allow us the opportunity to create contacts which will potentially lead to sources of funding. In fact we were able to raise immediate funds from these contacts.

Kosciusko Leadership Academy also provided us with a very nice contact, proving the resourcefulness of community involvement. We learned that United Way can and does have the ability to meet certain monetary requests for specific child related activities designed to educate. United Way was willing to make available, upon board approval, \$1,350 to sponsor ten children who show a desire to attend the camp but may lack the family resources to do so.

### Guals Obtained (cont.)

A new colored brochure was updated. The aim of this brochure is to once again create community awareness of the camp and it's services. The legwork has been completed with the information in the possession of a local printer when the board decides to proceed.

Yet another potentially successful contact came through one of our very own classmates. Sharmion Bowell who is employed through Bowen Center, created the opportunity for Bowen Center and Camp Mollenhour to work together in the future to satisfy two needs. The camp is searching for other uses of the camp and Bowen Center has a curriculum for special needs children which includes a week long outdoor retreat as an incentive to do well. It will hopefully one day be possible that Camp Mollenhour may become the sight of choice for these recreational retreats.

### Conclusion

In conclusion, we feel the long tradition of Camp Mollenhour in our community is of vital importance. With the growing need of technological experience we must not forget the continuos responsibility we have to our natural environment. This environment can provide numerous recreational activities for our children to enjoy. With the continuing promotion of our objectives Camp Mollenhour can remain a unique environmental experience for many young children.


Dear Campers and Parents,

We are excitedly anticipating our **62**<sup>nd</sup> year of Conservation Camps. As always, our goals are to help each child develop skills in conservation, teamwork, leadership, sportsmanship and an awareness of the outdoors. In order for us to provide for the safety and well-being of our campers while we work to accomplish these goals, we have the following rules:

- 1. Campers must be 9-14 years old they must have had their 9th birthday and not yet reached their 15th.
- 2. Registration forms and the \$135.00 camper's fee must be returned to C. O. Mollenhour Conservation Camp, Camp Registration, P. O. Box 1366, Warsaw, Indiana 46581-1366 no later than July 1, 1999. The camp is limited to the first 80 registrations. Payment must be made upon registration. (Late registrations will be charged an additional \$10,00 and will only be accepted on an availability basis.) If an organization or individual other than a parent or guardian is sponsoring a camper, a check or a letter from the sponsor with the sponsor's name and phone number included MUST accompany the registration form.
- 3. Check-in will begin at 2:30 p. m. on Sunday. Please no early check-in's!
- 4. No camper will be admitted without a signed "Consent for Medical Treatment" form on file to be turned in at registration.
- 5. The Camp Director should be informed if any child has special needs so that consideration can be made towards those needs.
- 6. If there is a valid reason that a camper must leave or be visited by parents during this week, special arrangements need to be made with the Camp Director during the check in time. Should an emergency arise during the week, please call the camp to inform the director of your needs. Separation of the child from the parent is part of the camp experience.
- 7. Each camper is to provide a sleeping bag, pillow, extra blankets, extra towels, toilet articles, insect repellent, sun screen, flashlight, bathing trunks, clothing for five days and rain gear. Athletic equipment or fishing gear may be brought to camp, but the camper must assume full responsibility for these items. The camp cannot be responsible for lost or stolen items. Please make sure all items are marked with your child's name.
- 8. DO NOT BRING BLOW DRYERS, VIDEO GAMES, RADIOS, KNIVES, POP, MONEY or FOOD. Please do not send items of value with your child.
- 9. For campers' safety, swimming is only allowed during specified times and under the supervision of a lifeguard. (We use the "buddy system" as an additional safety measure.)
- 10. Each camper is expected to help keep the camp clean and in working order as well as cooperate with counselors, other staff and fellow campers. Any damage to camp property will be the responsibility of the camper's parent or guardian.
- 11. We will make every effort to make each camper's stay an enjoyable one, but cooperation is very important. The Camp Director reserves the right to send a camper home at the parents expense if they become unmanageable.
- 12. Rules for acceptance and participation in the program is the same for everyone without regard to race, color, sex, age, religion, disability or national origin. Any person who believes he has been discriminated against in any USDA-related activity should write to: Secretary of Agriculture Washington, DC 20250.
- 13. THE AWARDS CEREMONY AND PICK-UP WILL BE ON FRIDAY AT 6:00 p. m. SHARP! There will be no dinner served Friday evening. PLEASE BE PROMPT.
